In her honor today, let us pray for those in consecrated life.</p>	<p>March 10</p> <p>Almsgiving is about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it’s about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God’s unconditional love.</p>	<p>March 11</p> <p>During Lent we often pray the seven penitential psalms, like this one, “You are my shelter; you guard me from distress; /with joyful shouts of deliverance you surround me” (Ps 32:7, NABRE).</p>	<p>March 12</p> <p>Lent is a time many often rededicate themselves to prayer. He wrote “Our way to repay God is to exalt him and confess his wonders before every nation under heaven” (St. Patrick, Confession, 3).</p>	<p>March 18</p> <p>St. Cyril of Jerusalem, honored today, was known for his “Catechetical Instructions.” Give thanks for the catechists in your community and all they do to educate children and adults alike.</p>	<p>March 19</p> <p>Solemnity of St. Joseph</p> <p>On the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we pray today for all fathers, that through the example of St. Joseph, they may fully embrace their vocation and accept the privilege and responsibility of caring for their children as St. Joseph cared for Jesus.</p>	<p>March 20</p>  <p>Abstaining from meat and other indulgences during Lent is a penitential practice. On the Fridays of Lent, we remember the sacrifice of Christ on Good Friday and unite ourselves with that sacrifice through abstinence and prayer.</p>	<p>March 21</p> <p>When confronted with your own weakness during Lent, don’t give in to anger, frustration, and self-pity. Be patient, and see yourself as God does, with unconditional love.</p>
<p>March 22</p> <p>Fourth Sunday of Lent</p> <p>The Fourth Sunday of Lent, known as Laetare Sunday, is the halfway point of Lent. Do an honest check-in with yourself today on your Lenten spiritual journey so far.</p>	<p>March 23</p> <p>Today, we mark the feast day of St. Turibius of Mogrovejo, a Spanish-born evangelizer who was sent as a missionary to Peru and opened the first seminary in the New World. In his honor, pray for vocations.</p>	<p>March 24</p> <p>“We need to reject the desire to identify only with those who are sinless. How could the Church have excluded sinners from her ranks? It is for their salvation that Jesus took flesh, died and rose again.” (Pope Benedict XVI, Meeting, May 25, 2006)</p>	<p>March 25</p> <p>Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord</p> <p>Today is the Solemnity of the Lord, celebrating the incarnation of Christ in Mary’s womb. It’s a great day to pray the Hail Mary.</p>	<p>March 26</p> <p>“You are a vessel; but as yet you are full. Pour out what you have, that you may receive what you have not.” (St. Augustine, <i>Homilies on the First Epistle of John</i>, 2.9)</p>	<p>March 27</p>  <p>“Almsgiving sets us free from greed and helps us to regard our neighbor as a brother or sister. Are you keeping to the spiritual goals you set at the beginning of the season?</p>	<p>March 31</p> <p>“In every act we do, in every step we take, let our hand trace the Lord’s cross.” (St. Jerome, <i>Letters</i>, 22.37)</p>	<p>April 1</p> <p>“For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted.” (Lk 18:14, NABRE)</p>	<p>April 2</p> <p>“By devoting more time to prayer, we enable our hearts to root out our secret lies and forms of self-deception, and then to find the consolation God offers. He is our Father and he wants us to live life well.” (Pope Francis, Message for Lent, 2018)</p>	<p>April 3</p> <p>“God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son, so everyone who believes in him might have eternal life.” (Jn 3:16, <i>Lectionary</i>)</p>	<p>April 4</p> <p>Today, we remember St. Isidore of Seville, patron of a medium that didn’t exist when he lived, the internet! Read what Pope Benedict XVI has to say about this saint.</p>

Pray that the Lord allow you to accompany him serenely during these Easter mysteries and you may emerge from them renewed in faith, hope and charity.</p>	<p>April 6</p> <p>Holy Week is here. If your Lenten journey has been difficult, remember that willing sacrifice helps us grow. Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial helps us to love like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for love of us.</p>	<p>April 7</p> <p>Say a prayer for all the elect, who are waiting to be baptized into the Church on Holy Saturday.</p>	<p>April 8</p> <p>Lent officially ends tomorrow as the Mass of the Lord’s Supper begins. Plan to participate in the moving liturgies of the Triduum in your parish.</p>	<p>April 9</p> <p>Holy Thursday</p> <p>“With the institution of the Eucharist, Jesus gave the Passover its new and definitive meaning. He showed himself to be the High Priest of the New Covenant, offering himself as the perfect sacrifice to the Father.” (USCCA, 216)</p>	<p>April 10</p> <p>Good Friday</p> <p>As we mark the day on which Jesus was crucified, pray the Stations of the Cross to reflect on Christ’s Passion.</p>	<p>April 11</p> <p>Holy Saturday</p> <p>As you prepare for Easter, reflect on how well you have lived your Lenten promises during this journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross.</p>
<p>April 12</p> <p>Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord</p> <p>“Christ is risen from the dead! Rise with him! Christ is returned again to himself! So you, too, return! Christ is freed from the tomb!
